Headlines nationwide are sounding alarms about the increased rate of suicide. Sadly, the epidemic of suicide takes a disproportional number of First Responder lives each year, with more losses from suicide than line of duty deaths.

AFM 911 is the First Responder Division of Armed Forces Mission. The two-fold objective of AFM 911 is first, to reduce suicide in the First Responder community and secondly, train Responders in the skills of suicide intervention for the communities they serve. We are fulfilling our mission to turn the tide on suicide through the Intervene Challenge.

More than 16,000 individuals have taken AFM's Intervene Challenge gaining skills that save lives. Clients served include Homeland Security, US ARMY, US AIR FORCE, hospitals, schools, universities and more than 5,000 First Responders.

Listen Learn Lead© (L3) is the primary curriculum in AFM's Intervene Challenge. AFM911 delivers the L3 model and the Intervene Challenge in a format to meet the unique needs of First Responders. Taught in a classroom setting, L3 is five hours of intensive instruction and simulation exercises enabling participants to gain additional skills and confidence to render aid to individuals at risk of suicide.

Along with a substantial increase in personal awareness, Learning Objectives of L3 training include:

- Evaluate myths that impede caregivers
- Roleplay and simulation exercises
- Identification of Community Resources
- Overcome fear of helping
- Develop life sustaining rapport
- Recognize cues in transition to safety

World class suicide intervention models have been in existence for decades. Yet suicide rates continues to increase. The Intervene Challenge is not a model of intervention - It's a Movement. Whether it's the mother who has lost a son, the team that has lost a coach, the soldier who has lost a battle buddy, or a police department that has lost a lieutenant; thousands are rising to the Challenge...

Dr. Lou Koon is an author, speaker, and Intervention Advocate. He serves as the Special Projects Liaison for Behavioral Health Link and the Georgia Crisis and Access Line. He was honored in 2016 as the Atlanta Trinity Awards Emergency Responder of the Year and inducted into the University of North Georgia Alumni Hall of Fame in 2018 for his work in conducting more than 1,100 suicide intervention in both military and civilian communities. He is

the author of Listen Learn Lead, the primary text in the Intervene Challenge and the CIT Chaplain for the Peachtree City Police Department. He a member of the Georgia Chiefs of Police Association, National Alliance on Mental Illness, International Critical Incident Stress Foundation, IACP, and ILEETA.

During his tenure in an ARMY Reserve unit with Soldiers in ten states he led the team that sustained 8 years of ZERO suicides at a time when suicide rates within the military are 20% higher than civilian communities. Lou continues to serve the USAR as a Chaplain (LTC) in a Signal Brigade. He is called upon by LEOs, Faith Groups, and individual community members to provide rapid response suicide intervention for hundreds of individuals in crisis each year.

Celebrating Seven Years of Continuous Growth
